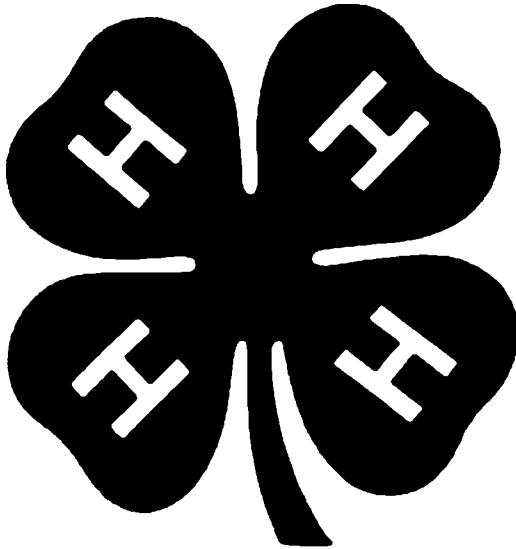

GENERAL RULES

1. Read carefully the general information, rules and regulations in the forepart of the Open Class Fair Book.
2. There will be different age classes in all sections. For projects with 4 levels, Level 1: 7-8 years; Level 2: 9-11 years; Level 3: 12-14 years; Level 4: 15-19 years. For projects with 3 levels: Level 1: 7-10 years; Level 2: 11-13 years; Level 3: 14-19 years.
3. All animals must be in the possession, care, and management of 4-H members by dates designated by the 4-H Livestock Committee. All entries for 4-H and FFA Livestock projects, including beef, sheep, swine, horses, dogs, and dairy projects, are due in the Extension Office by August 8. At any time during the project, each exhibitor agrees to provide for inspection of his or her exhibits by the exhibitor's 4-H club leader, agriculture education instructor, extension agent, Fair Board member and/or superintendent and show evidence of ownership.
4. Entries in this section are limited to members of the Rooks County 4-H Clubs and Rooks County Vocational Agriculture and Vocational Homemaking schools

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and Rooks County Family Community Education unit members. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the projects exhibited. Any article entered must be cleaned or laundered to exhibit.

5. All exhibits must be checked in by 5:00 p.m. Monday, August 15, in the 4-H Building except Livestock. (Check livestock departments for check-in/weigh-in times and check-out times. Market livestock will be allowed only one weigh-in.)
6. Herdsmanship Guidelines:
 - a. Contest is open to all 4-H clubs or FFA chapters showing Beef, Dairy Cattle, Goats, Horses, Sheep, or Swine at the Fair.
 - b. Contest is designed to encourage clubs or chapters to keep their livestock displays at the Fair in a neat, presentable manner.
 - c. The purpose is to maintain a more attractive livestock exhibit.
 - d. Contest starts on Tuesday afternoon and ends Friday evening.
 - e. Results will be posted following each evaluation.
 - f. The top 2 places by club in each species will be awarded.

Judging Guidelines for Herdsmanship (100 points)

- I. Cleanliness of alley and stall or pens.....45**
 - a. Bedding adequate, bright, dry, clean, and in place
 - b. Manure hauled out and deposited in designated areas
 - c. Alleys swept clean, free of dust and straw
 - d. Feed in front of animals only at feeding time
 - e. Watering points kept clean
 - II. Arrangement of Exhibit 15**
 - a. Exhibits lined up in attractive manner
 - b. Tack and boxes kept in neat, attractive manner
 - c. Hay and straw neat and orderly
 - d. Feed boxes and gear in area provided
 - III. Appearance of Animals.....30**
 - a. Animal clean and brushed
 - b. Animals securely tied and penned
 - c. Animals in stalls or pens between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. except when showing, grooming, or washing
 - IV. Stall Cards 10**
 - a. Readable from alley
 - b. Neatly arranged
 - c. Clean and complete
7. All 4-H Club and Vocational Agriculture entries in Livestock are eligible to show in Open Class. Breeding animals shown in Open Class are to be registered and must have registration papers available, if called for. Members entering in Open Class will be expected to be present to show their animals. If not present

at the time the entries are judged, exhibits will not be considered. Only the top 5 market animals from each species (beef, sheep, swine) are invited back to the Open Class Market Animal Show.

8. Animals shown in the Market classes are not eligible to be shown in Breeding classes, and vice versa.
9. Each 4-H/FFA Livestock entry must be shown by its owner when judged. In case substitution is absolutely necessary, the substitute must be a bona fide 4-H/FFA member.
10. All animal exhibitors must have participated in a Livestock Ethics Workshop and have completed a Livestock Ethics Agreement form. For market animals to be sold at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale, the member must sign the ethics form that he/she has complied with legal withdrawal times. (If withdrawal times have not been met, see Rule 21-1.) All 4-H livestock must comply with health requirements outlined in the Open Class Premium List. Both forms are a part of the combined entry card referred to in #3.
11. At any time after an animal arrives on the fairgrounds, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian. Market animals will require written notification of treatment administered, time, date, and withdrawal requirements submitted to the County Extension Agent prior to the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.
12. All sheep must be free of any signs of “sore mouth,” active fungal infection (ringworm), including club lamb fungus, and other contagious disease. All sexually intact sheep (ewes and rams) must be identified with an official USDA premise ID tag. If an exhibitor’s animal qualifies for a premise ID tag and is not tagged by fair time, that animal will not be able to participate in the 4-H Show or Livestock Sale. Sheep must be inspected by the Official Fair Veterinarian prior to unloading. Healthy lambs hauled with lambs having fungal infection may not unload.
13. Each exhibitor must show his/her animal in a lot that judges his animal (dog obedience, horse halter) before the animal is eligible to be shown in Showmanship or a Horsemanship class. Market animals must be within weight guidelines to be eligible for Champion and Reserve (see #19 for weight guidelines).
14. All members participating in a livestock show are required to return to the arena and clean the area immediately following the show.
15. Exhibits will be placed in the Purple, Blue, Red, or White ribbon group award system. In case of only 1 entry in a lot, the judge will have a right to place the exhibit in any 1 of the groups. Only the top 2 blue-ribbon exhibits from each class will be considered for Champion or Reserve Champion recognition. Exhibits must receive a blue ribbon to be considered for Champion or Reserve Champion recognition.
16. In Department 14 (Horticulture), Department 16 (Clothing), Department 18 (Foods & Nutrition), Department 21 (Woodwork), Department 22 (Photography), Department 23 (Crafts), Department 25 (Rocketry), and Department 26

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(Geology), projects will be judged by Level. A Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will be chosen in each level as well as an overall Champion. In Department 23 (Crafts), there will be a Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Class Champion. An overall Champion will be chosen from Crafts as well.

17. Prize money won by booths or any other club entry will be paid to the club or school.
18. All State Fair entries should be made in person at the Extension Fair Office by August 20 at 4:00 p.m. Only those 4-H exhibits (other than Livestock) that are designated by the judges will be eligible for State Fair. Swine, Sheep, Beef, Meat Goats

Members intending to sell animals during the sale must turn in a "Sale Intentions Form" to their **4-H community leader**. The leader must turn in the forms to the Fair Office by Thursday at 3:00 p.m. **No changes will be made after this time.**

4-H and FFA members are limited to one of the following:

2 Market Hogs, <i>or</i>	1 Market Lamb and 1 Market Goat, <i>or</i>
2 Market Lambs, <i>or</i>	1 Market Hog and 1 Market Goat, <i>or</i>
2 Market Goats, <i>or</i>	1 Market Steer and 1 Market Lamb,
1 Market Lamb and 1 Market Hog	Hog, <i>or</i> Goat

All animals sold in the sale must have been exhibited. No Market Hogs weighing under 230 lbs. or over 300 lbs. will be sold through the premium auction. No Market Steer weighing less than 1,000 lbs. will be sold. No Market Lamb that weighs less than 100 lbs. or more than 150 lbs. will sell. No Market Goat under 60 lbs. will be sold. A fee of \$25.00 will be withheld for each Market Steer, Hog, Lamb, and Goat that is sold through the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale. Beef, Sheep, and Swine checkoff fees will also be charged. Checkoff fees will be assessed at the rate of \$1.00 for Beef, \$.65 for Swine, and \$.25 for Sheep. All animals going through the sale will be penned and will not be removed until settlement is made with the sale committee. Under no circumstances may private treaty sale of an animal occur after the animal has gone through the ring and has been penned according to its intended destination.

An unlimited number of extra sheep, swine, and goats may be sold at the floor bid. Hogs weighing under 230 lbs. will be allowed to sell as extras as long as

a bid is received from the buyer. Beef extras will sell at auction following the premium sale. The price of all extra steers will be capped at the average resale of all steers resold during the premium auction.

Buy-back of any animal at the floor price is permissible and can be done by designating this to the sale committee at the time sale intentions are turned in. These animals shall be returned to the 4-H'er's designated fair pen and shall remain there until checkout time. Private treaty resale arrangements of these buy-back animals is permissible at any time prior to or following the sale. Pen-of-2 hogs may be sold by private treaty or may be sold as extras at the floor bid. Pen-of-2 steers may be sold by private treaty or may be auctioned as extras at the very end of the sale. The price cap on pen-of-2 steers will be the price of the average resale of all steers sold at resale during the auction.

20. A 4-H animal sold at public auction or privately, whether for immediate or future delivery, cannot, from the time of such sale, be shown by the seller or buyer in any Kansas 4-H show. This policy also applies to those animals which have gone through a premium auction whether or not ownership has changed. This rule applies to Breeding Sheep sold through a premium auction as a Market Lamb the previous year.
21. Any 4-H animal may be used for the Livestock Judging Contest at the discretion of the Livestock Superintendents.
22. Checkout time on all exhibits (except Livestock) is Saturday from 4:00-5:00 p.m.
23. **Rooks County 4-H/FFA Livestock Show Ethics**

Ethics

The showing of unethically fitted livestock or livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body. Animals showing signs of having been operated on, tampered with, or injected with illegal drugs or substances for the purpose of concealing faults in natural conformation, enhancing growth and development, or with the intent to deceive relative to the animal's age, soundness, or physical appearance, or exhibitors who abuse an animal will, at the discretion of the Livestock Ethics Committee, be disqualified and sanctions imposed as contained herein. Examples of abuse include (but are not limited to) beating, irritants, counter-irritants, and shocking or forcing a lamb into a solid object in attempts to make it brace more firmly. Other examples include extreme measures to alter animal weights or failure to care for an animal properly prior to or during the Fair. As a condition to participation in the Rooks County Free Fair livestock shows, every exhibitor must agree to: 1) participate in a Club Livestock Ethics Workshop, 2) complete and sign a livestock Ethics Agreement form, and 3) submit any animal so entered to inspection by a licensed veterinarian appointed by the Fair Board, agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated or requested by the superintendents and/or Livestock Ethics Committee, and

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agrees that the conclusions reached by the designated veterinarian shall be final, without recourse against the veterinarian, the Rooks County Free Fair, its officers, or employees.

In the event that tests prescribed prove that the animal contains a prohibited substance or show abuse of the animal, the Livestock Ethics Committee shall undertake to disqualify the animal and impose sanctions contained herein.

Due Process

The exhibitor may, by 9:00 a.m. of the date following notice of disqualification, appeal the ruling of the Livestock Ethics Committee in writing to the Rooks County Free Fair Board. Failure to appeal the ruling in writing within this time frame shall result in the disqualifications and sanctions becoming final. In the event a written appeal is lodged, the appeal will be reviewed and a decision returned by the Rooks County Free Fair Board by 9:00 a.m. of the day following the receipt of the appeal. The decision of the Rooks County Free Fair Board shall be final and unappealable.

Sanctions (tiered by severity of problem)

- a. Not meeting labeled withdrawal times of legal drugs which is beyond the control of the exhibitor will result in the youth's being allowed to show and sell in the premium auction. The animal must be bought back and taken home to observe the legal withdrawal time prior to sale or slaughter.
- b. At the discretion of the 4-H Livestock Ethics Committee, cases which border on animal abuse or neglect at any time during the Fair; direct criticism or interference with the judge, Fair, or livestock show management, or other exhibitors before, during, or after the event; or conspiring intentionally to violate the Ethics Agreement form may result in a warning being issued to the exhibitor. If the action persists, then it may result in disqualification. The term "animal" includes both market and breeding beef, sheep and swine, horses, dogs, dairy cattle, goats, poultry, pigeons, and rabbits. Disqualification prior to the show will result in the youth's being unable to participate in the show with the animal in question for that year. Disqualification after the show will result in the youth's returning all trophies, ribbons, and premium monies received.
- c. In the event that an illegal substance or unethical practice is utilized that is not harmful to people consuming the meat from the animal (i.e., air or oil injection, abuse, or unethical treatment), the individual will be disqualified and/or forfeit all trophies, ribbons, and premiums from all Rooks County Free Fair livestock shows for that year. In addition, the exhibitor may not sell any animals through the premium auction or as extras.
- d. In the event that an illegal substance is used that is dangerous to humans consuming the meat (i.e., Clenbuterol, etc.), the exhibitor will be disqualified and banned from all Rooks County Free Fair livestock shows for that year and all subsequent years. All trophies, ribbons, and premiums earned in any Rooks County Free Fair Livestock Shows that year will be forfeited.
- e. Any animal rejected at the slaughterhouse for reasons other than those out-

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lined in #3 and #4 will result in the exhibitor's reimbursing the buyer for the cost of the animal. All trophies, premiums, sale premiums, and ribbons will be retained by the exhibitor. Carcasses rejected at the slaughterhouse for reasons #3 or #4 will result in all sanctions outlined in that respective paragraph being imposed upon the exhibitor as well as reimbursing Live-stock Sale floor prices and premiums.

All instances of animal abuse, including illegal drug use, will be reported to the appropriate authorities.

23. Food Auction Guidelines

A "Silent Food Auction" will be held in the 4-H Foods Department. Eight items will be auctioned, including the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion in each class.

The starting minimum bid will be \$25.00. Bids will be accepted throughout the entire week of the Fair. Those individuals who have the highest bid at 3:00 p.m. Friday will be the official buyers of the food products. The entire proceeds will go to the 4-H'ers. The 4-H member will bake a new item and get it to the buyer as requested.

24. Copyright/Trademark Guidelines

In recent years, we have seen an increase in the use of copyrighted or trademark materials on 4-H exhibits. These include brand name use, logos, and quotations. Examples might be the Olympic rings, candy bar wrappers on nutrition posters, etc. To avoid problems and legal action, the State Fair guidelines are being revised, and we advise 4-H members to be mindful of this issue when working on any project.

Anytime you see the letter "c" with a circle around it, the owner of the material holds a copyright. The letter "r" in a circle means the material is a trademark.

If you feel you must use some of this material, contact the company for written permission. In many cases, you may have to pay a user fee. Attach this written permission to the project. In some cases, portions of materials may be used for "educational" purposes. An example of this might be to use the nutritional information from various food products during a demonstration. This would be "fair use" for educational purposes as long as the information was not used to promote one brand-name product over another.

It all boils down to this: originate your own work when developing demonstrations, talks, booths, and banners.

5. Exhibitors will be expected to wear correct attire. Riding helmets are acceptable in place of Western hats in riding events.

Western Class Attire:

Long pants and a long-sleeved shirt or blouse, may vary in color. Extremes of style and/or color, while permissible, are not representative of western attire and do not allow the exhibitor to be presented in a professional manner. In no instances shall "fancy" attire count over a nice, neat workmanship appearance. Exhibitor must wear a western hat, and it should stay on during the class. Hats are optional only in timed events.  - B. Present evidence that the entries were (1) purchased from a U.S. pullorum-typhoid clean source, and (2) be either the only poultry on the premises of the owner or have been physically separated (e.g., housed in separate houses) from other flocks on the premises.
 - C. Present an official VS Form 9-2 signed by an official blood-testing agent showing that the entries have had a negative result from an official pullorum-typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to the exhibition. The sealed legband numbers of the bird(s) must appear on the form.

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- D. Entries not qualifying under A, B, or C must indicate a negative test for pullorum-typhoid diseases at time of entry (testing to be done in even-numbered years).
2. Judging on all classes except Market Poultry will be done on basis of exhibition and production qualities. Members exhibiting well-developed birds of production qualities will be credited for them even if they vary slightly from standard perfection. Particular emphasis will be given to meat qualities in the Turkey class. Disqualifications will bar competition.

Rabies vaccination must be administered by a graduate, licensed veterinarian.
6. Abuse of a dog will result in disqualification.
7. Dogs in the obedience ring are recommended to wear well-fitting slip collars of leather, chain, or fabric. Fancy spiked, pinched, special training, or collars that are either too tight or so large that they hang unreasonably in front of the dogs are not permitted. There shall be no other objects hanging from the collars.
8. Dog height will be measured at the shoulders.
9. No dogs in season will be allowed. Dogs displaying aggressive behavior will be disqualified.
10. All dogs not in the arena showing must be on a leash or in a kennel/carrier.

7. The exhibitor may attach a 3" x 5" index card with the entry form to give the judge any information which the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know.
8. Clothing will be judged in 4 classes. Champions and Reserve Champions will be chosen in each class, if warranted by the judge, and an overall champion (Sweepstakes winner) will be named.
9. Educational classes—share with others what you learned in this project. If a poster, it must not be larger than 22" x 28." May be notebooks or other displays. Take care to select durable materials that will withstand State Fair conditions. Total display space must be no more than 12" high by 12" deep by 18" long. No card table exhibits will be allowed. Name and county must be clearly marked on education exhibits. See suggestions in the "Going Further" section of the notebook lesson plans for ideas. Examples might include information on textile fibers; illustrations of the art elements of line, shape, space, textures, and color; art principles of proportion, balance, etc.; coordinating a wardrobe; seam finishes; pressing techniques; shrink testing of fabrics, etc.

The exhibitor should attach an index card no larger than 3" x 5" with the entry form to give the judge any information on what parts of the exhibit he/she made, processes used, or other information which the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge. For all items, please indicate if the item was made from a kit. For knitted and crocheted items, please indicate fiber content and specifically if they are made of at least 90% wool.

4. Layer cakes must be 2 or more complete layers, any shape.

5. Cakes may be made from your favorite recipe or a commercial mix.
6. All unfrosted cakes shall be exhibited in upright position with top crust showing except for those cakes made with special designs such as bundt cakes. They should have top crust down.
7. Recipe (required) and nutritional information (optional) shall be attached securely to top side of the exhibit.
8. All food (except champions and perishables) will be sold at food sale as soon as judged Monday.
9. Definition for “Educational Exhibit”: can be a poster (it must not be larger than 22” x 28”), notebook, or other display showing and describing something learned, a project activity done, a food-nutrition community service program. Total space required for display must be no more than 12” high by 12” deep and 18” long. The educational display should relate to things done in the project in which exhibitor is enrolled. Do not use any copyrighted characters or slogans in the completed poster (examples: Mickey Mouse, Superman, Disney, etc.).
10. Fruit pies are acceptable.
11. Projects in each class that require food preservation will be exhibited in Department 19—Food Preservation (examples: canning, drying, jelly, jam).
12. The exhibitor may attach a 3” x 5” index card with the entry form to give the judge any additional information which the exhibitor thinks may be helpful for the judge to know.
13. A food gift package must contain at least 3 different food items prepared for human consumption, made by the 4-H'er and packaged in a suitable container no larger than 18” x 18” x 18.” Prepared food items must have recipes attached with the entry. Additional homemade food items beyond the 3 minimum, or purchased items, may also be included in the gift basket. The foods will not be opened or tasted. On an attached 3” x 5” index card, the 4-H'er should describe in 50 words or less the purpose and intended use of the food gift package and what safety precautions were taken during and after preparation. No alcoholic beverages will be accepted in gift baskets.
14. State Fair Rules for Foods and Nutrition: a member may enter only one **non-perishable** product and one **educational display** in this department.
15. A past Champion or Reserve Champion recipe cannot be exhibited again by the same 4-H'er.
16. No alcohol or perishable items or garnishes should be included as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with alcohol or perishable items or garnishes in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.

3. Each member may enter up to 2 exhibits in this department but only 1 entry per lot.
4. Exhibit must be sealed in a non-decorated, clean, standard canning jar with matching brand 2-piece lid.

5. Jar must be sealed when entered.
6. Jelly must be in ½-pint or pint jars. All other products must be in pint or quart jars.

1. Exhibitors shall be designated as follows:

Class A – Ages 7 and 8

Class C – Ages 12, 13, and 14

Class B – Ages 9, 10, and 11

Class D – Ages 15 and older

2. The exhibitor may attach a 3" x 5" index card with the entry form to give the judge any information which the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know.

CLASS (SPECIFY A, B, C, OR D)

Lot 1 — Single exhibit

Lot 2 — Original single exhibit: create own design or pattern. Also include a statement as to how you used the design elements and principles in creating your original exhibit.

Lot 3 — Poster or notebook: may include swatches, colors, stories, photographs, and project records which detail what was accomplished this year with a given indication of long-term plans.

DEPARTMENT 21 — WOODWORK

Assistant Superintendents: Seth Armbrister, Jacob Brull

1. Each member may have 2 exhibits per lot.

2. The plan from which the exhibit was constructed must be attached to each article. The plan may be a photocopy, the actual pattern, or a scale drawing. It must be complete and accurate to the extent that a duplicate article could be built using the plan. The plan should also include a bill of materials listing the cost of all supplies, including all wood, hardware, and finishing supplies, as well as amount of time spent constructing and finishing the project.

3. Any project with glass items such as glass shelves, glass tops, etc., should be exhibited without the glass. Items such as gun cases, cabinets, etc., with non-removable secured glass may be exhibited with the glass in place.

4. In judging woodwork articles, consideration will be given to usefulness, design, workmanship, choice of wood, suitability and quality of finish.

5. Woodworking will be judged in 4 classes:

Class A – Ages 7 and 8

Class C – Ages 12, 13, and 14

Class B – Ages 9, 10, and 11

Class D – Ages 15 and older

Champions will be chosen in each class, and an overall champion (Sweepstakes winner) will be named.

CLASS (SPECIFY A, B, OR C)

Lot 1 — Woodwork articles for farm or shop use

Lot 2 — Lawn furniture

Lot 3 — Household furniture

Lot 4 — Other woodwork articles not included in above classes (examples: bird houses, bird feeders, household equipment such as knife racks, bread boards, door stops, etc.)

DEPARTMENT 21 — WOODWORK

Lot 5 — Piece of repaired and refinished furniture (a brief explanation of the work completed must be attached to the exhibit)

DEPARTMENT 22 — PHOTOGRAPHY

1. Each exhibitor will be limited to 4 entries. The fourth entry may be a sequence, series, or photo album.
2. Exhibitor can enter 3 photos in 1 lot.
3. Exhibitor may enter only in lots for unit in which enrolled this year.
4. Photographs exhibited must be the result of the current year's project work by the 4-H member.
5. Black-and-white and color photographs, as well as videos may be exhibited.
6. Photos are to be mounted across the narrow (11") dimension of an 11" x 12½" sheet of white or cream studio matte board. Do not use foam core board. Photos mounted on poster board will not be displayed.
7. Remove white border from the enlargement before mounting. All photos must be no larger than 8" x 10" and no smaller than 7" x 9" after trimming.
8. Photos must be mounted with the top edge of the print 1" below the top of the mount. The sides of the print must be equal distance from the 2 sides of the mount.
9. A permanent mount must be made by using photographic adhesive. The Extension Office has matte boards from the K-State Research and Extension Distribution Office.
10. No lettering is permitted on the front of the mount or on the photo, only on the form provided. No underlay or borders are to be used. No contact prints allowed on front of mount.
11. The Kansas State Fair 4-H Photography ID Form must be used and mounted correctly on the bottom front of the matte board.
12. On the back of the mount write: 1) the exhibitor's name, 2) the exhibitor's address, 3) photo class, 4) location where the photograph was taken, and 5) "Phillips-Rooks District, Rooks County."
13. Improperly mounted photos (including prints with white borders not removed) will be awarded a ribbon 1 placing lower than the placing determined by the official judge.
14. Photographs taken with a digital camera and having no more adjustments than exposure, color intensity or correction, or click filter effects, red eye removal, cropping, dodging, and burning should be entered in the standard color or black-and-white classes.

15. Digital images that have had objects added or removed, multiple filter effects applied, or black-and-white and color combined must be entered in the lot for "Computer Manipulated Photo."
16. The black-and-white lot is for black-and-white prints only. Monochromatic prints, including sepia prints, are considered color photos and must be entered in the appropriate color photo lot.
17. A Champion and Reserve Champion will be chosen in each class, and an overall champion (Sweepstakes winner) will be named.
18. Photography judging will be by consultation-style judging on Tuesday.
19. A Photography Judging Contest will be held Wednesday from 1:30-3:00 p.m.
20. An asterisk ("*") means there is **no** State Fair class for this lot.
21. Photography will be judged in 4 classes:

Class A – Ages 7 and 8

Class C – Ages 12, 13, and 14

Class B – Ages 9, 10, and 11

Class D – Ages 15 and older

CLASS (SPECIFY A, B, C, OR D)

Lot 1 — Color photos taken by a 4-H member with 3 years or less in the project

Lot 2 — Color photos taken by a 4-H member with 4-7 years in the project

Lot 3 — Color photos taken by a 4-H member with 8 or more years in the project

Lot 4 — Black-and-white photos, all levels of experience (black-and-white prints only)

Lot 5 — Computer manipulated photos

Photo must be from an original(s) taken by the exhibitor and must include a second 11" x 12½" matte board mounted with standard size print or prints (if more than one photo was used) of the original photo(s) and 3" x 5" cards explaining what manipulation was done. May include additional photos (standard size and may be layered) showing editing steps.

Lot 6 — Photos (from film only) with special effects (darkroom manipulation of print and/or in-camera manipulation of the negative)

Lot 7 — Videos (may be either VHS or DVD)

All videos are to be original and result of the member's current year's work. Criteria for judging shall include: 1) evidence of story line; 2) use of camera angles; 3) use of zooming techniques; 4) smoothness of scene changes. No time or date should be imprinted on the tape or disc. In addition, all the rules of photographic techniques such as the rule of thirds, composition, framing, etc., will apply. Videos should be no longer than 5 minutes and should comply with copyright regulations. Sounds should follow the story line and should be more than dialog, but sound is not a required feature. Titles may be used but are not required.

1. Each member is limited to 12 entries with no more than 3 entries per lot.
2. Each exhibit is to be labeled. Label should be attached in an inconspicuous place and should contain name of exhibit, class, lot number, and exhibitor's name.
3. **Entries that are not properly prepared for wall hanging will be dropped one ribbon placing.** Stick-on hangers, hangers attached with tape, small serrated metal hangers, or string will **NOT** be accepted. Pictures in frames must have wire in place for hanging. Bulldog clamps may be used to hang matted pictures. All art will be judged on **OVERALL** appearance, including neatness and hangability of frame.
4. State Fair rules for Arts and Crafts: each county is allowed a specific number of exhibits according to the number of members enrolled in the project. Art and craft items are displayed at the State Fair and not judged.
5. Crafts will be judged in 3 classes. Champions will be chosen in each class, and an overall champion (Sweepstakes winner) will be named.
6. For Classes A and B in water color, better quality water color paper is not required. Class C will be expected to use better quality paper unless this is the first year in the phase.

2. Articles that have been in use should be cleaned for exhibit.
3. A sheet of operating instructions must be furnished for any exhibit not self-explanatory.
4. Exhibit must be operable. If battery power is required, batteries must be furnished.
5. Any project with a complexity of size or electronics must have (1) instructions for assembly and use, and (2) equipment available at the time of judging for actual testing of the exhibit.
6. No hand-dipped solder may be used on exhibits.
7. Exhibitors shall be designated as follows:

Class A – Ages 7 and 8

Class C – Ages 12, 13, and 14

Class B – Ages 9, 10, and 11

Class D – Ages 15 and older

CLASS (SPECIFY A, B, C, OR D)

- Lot 1 — Household wiring and indoor lighting (includes original, kit, or restoration of project such as a lamp, small appliance, or other item intended for household usage)
- Lot 2 — Outdoor wiring and shop lighting (includes original, kit, or restoration of project such as portable spot light, shop light, portable power tool, or other item intended for shop or outdoor usage)
- Lot 3 — Extension cords and trouble lights (includes original, kit, or restoration of extension cords or trouble lights)
- Lot 4 — AC demonstration project (includes projects which are AC in nature such as household wiring demonstration of switches or outlets, entrance panels, or other AC demonstration projects)
- Lot 5 — DC demonstration project (includes projects which are DC-battery powered such as series/parallel lighting, motor, household bell, or other types of projects)
- Lot 6 — Motor, fan, heater, or blower (includes original, kit, or restoration which utilizes an AC or DC motor, fan, heater, or blower)
- Lot 7 — Electronic project (includes original, kit, or restoration of electronic project which utilizes at least 1 electronic component such as resistor, transistor, or capacitor. Project may be soldered or bread-board construction.)
- Lot 8 — Educational activity project (includes AC or DC projects for an activity with an educational emphasis such as types of wiring, identification of components, or testing one's knowledge such as quiz boards)

DEPARTMENT 25 — ROCKETRY

Assistant Superintendents: Conrad Griebel, Madison McClellan,
Morgan Beougher, Joel Green

1. Each exhibitor may enter 1 to 3 rockets made during the current year. One of the rockets, whether exhibiting 1, 2, or 3 rockets, must have been flown. Rockets may have been flown prior to painting and applying decals.

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2. The report that accompanies the rocket **must be limited to the 4-H Rocket Exhibit Information Form, which is glued to an 10" x 13" envelope**. Plans (or a photocopy of them) must be placed inside the envelope. Photographs are also required with the exhibit. Place one 8½" x 11" page of photographs, only 1 side covered, inside the envelope
3. Angles of the fins must fit a plus-or-minus 2-degree variation.
4. Exhibit must be smooth and uniform, and assembled according to accompanying plans.
5. Engines and ignitors are not permitted with the exhibits.
6. Each rocket must stand freely by itself or be supported on a wooden base not to exceed ¾" thick by 8" square. Wooden or metal support rods must not extend past the nose cone and must be in the upright position. Do not exhibit on a launch pad.
7. Exhibitors who exhibit a rocket using a size E, 2 D's, 4 C's, 8 B's engine or larger will be required to provide National Association of Rocketry (NAR) membership number on the exhibit information sheet.
8. Beginner kits with prefabricated plastic fin assemblies and prefinished rockets requiring no painting are acceptable for the County Fair but **will not** be eligible for State Fair competition.
9. Rocketry will be judged in 4 classes:
Class A – Ages 7 and 8
Class B – Ages 9, 10, and 11
Class C – Ages 12, 13, and 14
Class D – Ages 15 and older

Champions will be chosen in each class, and an overall champion (Sweepstakes winner) will be named.

CLASS (SPECIFY A, B, C, OR D)

- Lot 1 — Rocket made from beginner kit with prefabricated plastic fin assemblies and/or prefinished (not eligible for State Fair competition)
- Lot 2 — Rocket made from a kit
- Lot 3 — Rocket made from original materials
- Lot 4 — Rocket designed and built by 2 or more members (include original plans, not merely a modification of a kit)

DEPARTMENT 26 — ROBOTICS

1. Each exhibitor may enter 1 to 3 robotics made during the current year.
2. Each robot must be able to stand or sit freely by itself without additional support. The robot's dimensions must be no larger than 2' wide x 2' deep x 2' high.
3. The report that accompanies the robot must be limited to the **4-H Robotics Exhibit Information Form, which is glued to a 10" x 13" envelope**. Robot

construction plans (or copies) and/or copies of the programming code if the robot is programmable must be placed inside the envelope.

- All electronic components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. All robots must include an on/off switch for operation.
- Robots that include weaponry for the purpose of causing physical harm to another robot will be disqualified.
- Robots must be powered by electricity, battery, water, or solar source. Any robot powered by fossil fuels or flammable liquids will be disqualified.
- The robot must be able to accomplish the goal the maker designed it for (examples: vacuuming the floor; finding the brightest spot in the room; mimicking life; following a line).
- Robotics will be judge in 4 classes:

Class A — Ages 7-8

Class C — Ages 12-14

Class B — Ages 9-11

Class D — Ages 15 and older

CLASS (SPECIFY A, B, C, OR D)

- Lot 1 — Robot made from a commercial (purchased) kit; include construction plans
- Lot 2 — Robot designed by exhibitor (may not be a mere modification of an existing robot kit or plan); include original construction plans
- Lot 3 — Robot designed by 2 or more members (may not be a mere modification of an existing robot kit or plan); include original construction plans

DEPARTMENT 27 — GEOLOGY

Assistant Superintendents: Lora Belle Sander, Michael Dix, Andrea Dix

- The exhibit box should be 18" x 24" x 3½". **Plexiglas covers are required. Boxes with glass covers WILL NOT be accepted.** All specimens are to be arranged across the narrow (18") dimension of the exhibit box, making the exhibit 18" across the top and 24" deep exactly. If a box has a sliding plexiglas cover, it must be removable from the top. Screws, locks, or other devices that would prevent judges from removing the cover should not be used.
- Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county or district, and number of specimens inside the upper left corner of the plexiglas cover (use clear double-sided tape to adhere gummed labels), and by attaching a label with the same information outside on the lower right corner of the box.
- Exhibitor may enter in both Geology and Lapidary classes. Exhibitor may show in only 1 of the first 3 Geology classes (A, B, C). Exhibitor may also show in Geology Class E (Special Exhibit) and in 1 Lapidary class.
- Geology specimens should be labeled with the number of the specimen, date collected, specimen name or description, and locality (county) where collected.

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5. For the Geology classes (A, B, C, and D), specimens should be mounted in the box by the proper groups (rocks, minerals, fossils).
6. For the Geology classes (A, B, C, and D), all specimens must be collected from locations in Kansas. Out-of-state specimens will not count in the minimum number for the class, nor will they be considered in the judging.

CLASS A

Lot 1 — Geology; display at least 15 rocks, minerals, and fossils collected during the current 4-H year. Limited to 1 exhibit box 18" x 24" x 3½" with **plexiglas** cover. Only those exhibiting at the State Fair for the first time may enter this class. Fossils must be identified to the phylum level.

CLASS B

Lot 11 — Geology; display at least 30 different rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. **At least 15 must have been collected during the current 4-H year.** Limited to 1 exhibit box 18" x 24" x 3½" with **plexiglas** cover. This class is open to those exhibiting either the first or second time at the State Fair. Fossils must be identified to the phylum level.

CLASS C

Lot 21 — Geology; display at least 45 rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. **At least 15 must have been collected during the current 4-H year.** More than 1 specimen of the same kind of rock, mineral, or species of a fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents **different** geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction ("Fort Hays Limestone," not just "Limestone"). Exact species must have different formation names listed on the ID card ("Composita Brachiopoda from Morrill Limestone," not just "Brachiopoda" or "Composita Brachiopoda"). Exhibit limited to 2 boxes 18" x 24" x 3½" with **plexiglas** cover. Rocks must be identified by their proper name and type. Fossils must be identified to the phylum level. This class is open to those exhibiting either the third or fourth time at the State Fair.

CLASS D

Lot 31 — Geology; display at least 60 rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. **At least 15 must have been collected during the current 4-H year.** More than 1 specimen of the same kind of rock, mineral, or species of a fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents **different** geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction ("Fort Hays Limestone," not just "Limestone"). Exact species must have different formation names listed on the ID card ("Composita Brachiopoda from Morrill Limestone," not just "Brachiopoda" or "Composita Brachiopoda"). Exhibit limited to 2 boxes 18" x 24" x 3½" with **plexiglas** cover. Rocks must be identified by their proper name and type. Fossils must be identified to the phylum, class, and genus levels, if possible. This class is open to those exhibiting the fifth time or more at the State Fair.

CLASS E

Lot 41 — Geology; exhibit relating to everyday living; or to a mineral test, a rock formation, geological history, species of a fossil, forms of 1 mineral, a

variation of 1 kind of rock, archaeological artifacts, or Indian artifacts. Exhibit limited to 4' of table space. **Exhibitor should take care to use durable materials that will withstand State Fair conditions.** Exhibitor may show in the class regardless of number of times he or she has exhibited at the State Fair or whether exhibitor has entries in Classes A, B, C, or D. Exhibitor may also exhibit in Lapidary class.

CLASS F

- Lot 51 — Lapidary; display at least 30 stones and minerals that will cut or polish. Five of the specimens must be collected by the member from the native site (not limited to Kansas). Polish 15 of the gemstones by tumbling. Label, giving identification of material and county where collected (or state or country of origin for non-Kansas material).
- Lot 52 — Lapidary; display at least 6 gemstones and minerals that have received lapidary treatment. Lapidary treatment may consist of tumbling, polishing, and end or face or flat lapping. Specimens must represent at least 3 different gem stones and minerals and include at least 3 cabochons of any size or shape. Three of the specimens must be mounted. Label specimens as appropriate.

DEPARTMENT 28 — ENTOMOLOGY

Assistant Superintendents: Sandy Keas, Chelsey Kriley, Macy Odle

1. All entries are to be placed in wooden, plexiglas-covered boxes with outside measurements of 18" x 24" x 3½." See specific phase for box and specimen number limitations.
2. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box by placing an identification label bearing the exhibitor's name and county, and the class inside the upper left corner of the box, and by attaching a label with the same information outside on the lower right corner of the box. Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.
3. The number of orders and specimens (and families, where required) must be included on the box identification label.
4. Two labels are required on each specimen. The labels should be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. The first label beneath the insect is the common name, and the date/locality label is beneath the common name.
5. Specimens should be grouped by orders in the display boxes.
6. Educational displays are limited to 1 standard-sized box labeled as indicated above. Information on numbers and kinds of insects is not needed. Displays are limited to 150 specimens and may consist of specialized groups of insects or relate to any aspect of insect life. The title of the display should be indicated inside the box, and the display should consist of the current year's work.

CLASS A—INTRODUCTORY ENTOMOLOGY (7 AND 8 YEARS OLD)

- Lot 1 — Insect collection, at least 6 orders, including 15 to 30 species in a single

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box grouped according to order. Insect names are not necessary on individual specimens, but date/locality labels are required. Date/locality labels simply tell the date and where the insect was found (example: 7/12/94, under rock). This class is not eligible for the State Fair.

CLASS B—BEGINNING ENTOMOLOGY (9-14 YEARS OLD)

Lot 11 — Beginning Entomology I. Collection display in 1 standard box with a minimum of 50 and a maximum of 125 species representing at least 7 orders. Specimens should be grouped according to order with order labels pinned to the base of the box.

Lot 12 — Beginning Entomology II. Collection display in 1 standard box with a minimum of 75 and a maximum of 150 species representing at least 9 orders. Specimens should be grouped according to order with order labels pinned to the base of the box.

CLASS C—INTERMEDIATE ENTOMOLOGY (15 YEARS OR OLDER)

Lot 21 — Collection display in 1 or 2 standard boxes with a minimum of 100 and a maximum of 300 insects representing at least 10 orders. All specimens should be grouped to order. In addition, all insects in the orders of Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Homoptera, Coleoptera, Diptera, and Hymenoptera are to be identified to family, and the number of families in these orders must be recorded on the box-identification label. Family labels will be pinned to the bottom of the box to represent subdivisions of the appropriate order.

Lot 22 — Intermediate educational exhibit

CLASS D—ADVANCED ENTOMOLOGY (15 YEARS OR OLDER)

Lot 31 — Collection display in 1 to 3 standard boxes with a minimum of 150 and a maximum of 450 specimens representing at least 12 orders. Family identification is required for all insects belonging to the 6 basic orders as outlined under the Intermediate phase. Family identification of insects in the remaining orders is optional but desirable as long as accuracy is maintained. All butterflies appearing in the collection should be labeled with the correct common name. The 4-H'er must list on the back of the box what he did this year to improve the project.

Lot 32 — Advanced educational exhibit

DEPARTMENT 29 — WILDLIFE, FORESTRY, and SHOOTING SPORTS

Assistant Superintendents: Kody Niblock, Alexander Towns

CLASS A—WILDLIFE

Exhibitors must comply with State and Federal laws. It is illegal to possess threatened or endangered wildlife, or the feathers, nests, or eggs of non-game birds. Game birds and game animals taken legally during season may be used. The use of live wild animals for education exhibits is prohibited.

DEPARTMENT 29 — WILDLIFE, FORESTRY, SHOOTING SPORTS

- Lot 1 — Notebook (contents pertain to some phase, result, story, or information about the wildlife project)
- Lot 2 — Educational poster (must be related to something learned in the wildlife project)

1. All leaf exhibits are to be mounted on 8½" x 11" heavy stock paper and placed in loose-leaf binders (magnetic or adhesive filler sheets for photographic prints are recommended). Twigs and fruit collections may be exhibited in whatever manner exhibitor chooses (maximum exhibit size is 2' x 3').
 2. Name, club, age, and year in project should be on front cover or in a prominent location.
 3. Leaf should be identified with an appropriate label located near the leaf on the same page. These labels should include: 1) the proper common name as listed in the 4-H Bulletin 334, "List of Native Kansas Forest Trees"; 2) location (city and/or county) where collected; and 3) age (day, month, year) collected.
 4. Intermediate Forester: exhibit only in phase(s) enrolled.
 5. Divide specimens into the following 2 sections: "Native Kansas Trees" and "Non-Native Trees."
 6. New specimens are those specimens collected during the current 4-H year and cannot be a duplicate tree species of previously displayed specimens.
 7. Have sample grouped according to the year (such as "old/previous" and "new").
 8. Variations of varieties do not count as different species or specimens.
 9. When replacing previously displayed samples, the specimen label must be updated. Replacements do not count as new specimens.
 10. If the exhibitor retrieves information for his/her forestry exhibit, he/she must include a reference citation to the source.
 11. In all leaf collections (Intermediate Forester), exhibit one complete leaf where possible. If leaf is too large, exhibit as much as possible. Sketch in reduced scale the entire leaf and illustrate where the exhibited portion is from. **Note:** A "leaflet" is incorrect when displayed as the complete leaf for the tree.
- Lot 11 — Beginning
Exhibit a minimum of 10 different leaves from native Kansas trees collected within the year. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.
- Lot 12 — Beginning
Exhibit a minimum of 5 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected.
- Lot 13 — Intermediate
Exhibit a minimum of 20 different leaves (including 10 new specimens)

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from native Kansas trees. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

Exhibit a minimum of 15 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new leaf, twig, and fruit specimens.

Lot 17 — Advanced

Exhibit a minimum of 40 different leaves (including 20 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

Lot 18 — Advanced

Exhibit a minimum of 20 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 10 new leaf, twig, and fruit specimens.

Lot 19 — How a Tree Grows (display)

Entry may include a project notebook with 10 or more seeds collected with pictures showing a germination study, a mounting of a thin section of wood cut from the end of a log or top of stump labeled with information such as kind of wood and age of tree when cut, or exhibits and illustrations of how a tree grows.

Lot 20 — Tree Appreciation (display)

Entry may include a research or reporting project notebook with no more than 10 pages based on the exhibitor's selected tree. This notebook may include sketches, drawings, pictures, a story, or any other things which will help tell about the tree he/she has selected.

9. Other foods may be exhibited on white paper or plastic plates.
10. Enclose all food products in a plastic bag.
11. All unfrosted cakes shall be exhibited in upright position with top crust showing.
12. No box mixes are to be used except where specified.

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13. Photography should be matted and ready to hang.

15. Photos should have attached information, including shutter speed and aperture if taken with a 35mm camera. If self-printed, development should be included.
